cyberpunk manga let me recommend Martin de la Iglesia's *Has Akira Always Been a Cyberpunk Comic* which radically redefines the status of Akira 1982 1993 as trans generic paying attention to the genre consciousness of the contemporary readers of its Euro American editions Next Denis Taillandier's *New Spaces for Old Motifs The Virtual Worlds of Japanese Cyberpunk* interprets the significance of Japanese hardcore cyberpunk novels such as Goro Masaki's *Venus City* 1995 and Hirotaka Tobi's *Grandes Vacances* 2002 translated as *The Thousand Year Beach* 2018 and *Ragged Girl* 2006 paying special attention to how the authors created their virtual landscape in a Japanese way For a full discussion of William Gibson's works please read Janine Tobek and Donald Jellerson's *Caring About the Past Present and Future in William Gibson's Pattern Recognition and Guerilla Games Horizon Zero Dawn* along with my own *Transpacific Cyberpunk Transgeneric Interactions between Prose Cinema and Manga* The former reconsiders the first novel of Gibson's new trilogy in the 21st century not as realistic but as participatory whereas the latter relocates Gibson's essence not in cyberspace but in a junkyard making the most of his post Dada Surrealistic aesthetics and Lo Tek way of life as is clear in the 1990s Bridge trilogy *Fragile World* William T.
