Students are learning many strategies that help them generate ideas to write about. Below are a few strategies your child has learned. When they are ready, suggest some of the following to help them get over their writer's block.

- Make lists of interesting people, places, objects, animals, or significant places, all special moments in your life, like the first time you learned to ride a bicycle, etc. When you have a few written down, choose one to write about.
- Start collecting family stories. If you've heard a particular family story again and again, write it down, record it, especially if you're told it by someone whose story is special. It's best to be family members who tell it and who share stories about it.
- Look around! When you see a friend or family member, like your brother, sister, a particular house, an old picture, when a car is in your mind?
